## Notes for these lessons

- Practise reading new words with word cards showing the sound button side.
- Words in red and brackets were tricky words that are now decodable.
- Lesson 1: Sort the words: Use two images, such as /a/ 'astronaut' and /ai/ 'tail', to sort the words.
- **Read longer words:** Use the chunking method, if needed, to support children reading these longer words. Aim for the children to be able to read the words without chunking them up. Over time, these words should enter the children's orthographic store and become fluent.
