Design a poster that says "<u>thank you</u>" to London transport staff who are making sure key workers can travel to their essential jobs!


Go for a walk outside and stay 2 metres away

Techniques and materials

There are lots of ways that you can create your poster—here are a few suggestions of materials you can use, depending on what you have around your house.



Collage

You will need glue, scissors and coloured paper, pictures or magazines that you are allowed to cut or rip up. The idea is to build up a pattern or image using lots of different pieces of paper that you fit together and stick down.

Drawing

We all know how to draw! Use your favourite pens or pencils to draw the picture you'd like to share your poster information. You might want to sketch out a plan for your picture on scrap paper first.

Printing

There are many different types of printing, some of which are very simple. You might have ink stamps at home which you can print with, or you can make your own with cardboard, scissors and paint. Cut out your cardboard carefully into shapes, then cover one side with paint and press down onto your poster.

Photography

You can use a photograph to illustrate your poster! You can upload your photo on your computer and do create the poster on your screen. Or, if you have a printer at home, print your photograph and stick it onto a piece of paper and add writing by hand.

Painting

You can use paint and brushes, or your fingers! You might want to draw your design out first and then add colour with the paint, or just go for it and paint straight onto your poster paper
