Amazingly, only 6 people were believed to have died. The fire started at a baker's shop

- 8 The baker's name was Thomas Farriner.
- **9** The street was called Pudding Lane.
- 10 It took 50 years to rebuild the area destroyed by the fire.
- 11 68 churches were destroyed.
- The original St Paul's Cathedral was destroyed'
- Building the new St Paul's cathedral started in 1675, almost 9 years after the fire.
- There was no fire brigade in London at the time so people has to fight the fire themselves.
- They got the water from the river Thames.
